Hello,

I am writing to you as an Alton Village resident who disagrees greatly with the rezoning to 4853 Thomas Alton Boulevard to allow for two 19 storey buildings.

I am mostly concerned about the resulting increase in traffic in this area as well as the crowding of our local public schools.

The traffic in this area has increased significantly and I've noticed an increase in traffic incidents around the Dundas and Appleby intersection making this area less safe for local residents. The traffic on my street is also of concern as I live on Steeplechase Drive which is the same street as Alton Village Public School. The school seems to be at max capacity while the speed of traffic on Steeplechase ever increases as parents rush their kids to school.

My concern is that, with the resulting increase in population from the proposed high density housing, the school cannot effectively accommodate the increase in student population. The other concern is that the local residential roads around the school become increasingly congested and unsafe for my family.

The Zoning Bylaw Amendment seeks to further amend the property's RAL4-331 zone to a modified RAL4 zone that would expand upon the permitted building forms to include varying low-rise, townhouse forms and high-rise apartment buildings, increase the maximum allowable density and floor area, and introduce site-specific performance standards for each of the proposed building forms (e.g. reduced amenity area, parking, and yard requirements).

The amendment is seeking an increase in max storeys from the allowable 10 to 19. The proposed development is 612 residential units. Per my email below, while I understand the pressures from developers to develop within the Alton community, they are seeking to essentially double the allowable units than previously zoned for the area.

The town is basically saying, "the developer is going to give us \$60K and we'll put it towards a park nearby". I just don't understand how that helps the overcrowding of the local schools and the increased traffic congestion in the neighborhood. The \$60K is a drop in the bucket. It also sets an incredibly dangerous precedent given there are no residential or commercial buildings even close to 19 storeys in the area. It essentially opens the door to any developer who wants to build high density housing in Alton Village. All they have to do is throw \$60K at the council.

To me, there is nothing in it for the community and frankly given the lack of consideration of the impact on the schools and neighborhood. If the "staff are of the opinion that the proposed community benefits are appropriate based on the increased density recommended for the site" then I question the integrity of those making the decisions on this matter.

As you are aware we have one regular elementary school and one high school both at over capacity. Traffic in Alton village during peak times is ridiculous. There is no space or provision for additional schools. In addition, we have Alton Village West development on the corner of Walkers Line and Dundas. This will further impact traffic flow through Alton Village.

I therefore wholly oppose this development proposal. I understand that development should be allowed but anything other than single storey homes will have a significant and detrimental impact on traffic and schooling within Alton Village. As a resident of Alton Village I must voice concern over the proposed development of the twin towers at 4853 Thomas Alton Blvd.

While I strongly support economic development and appreciate the benefits that can accompany growth, I moved from downtown Toronto to Alton Village three years ago to escape the proliferation of high rises. They simply don't have a place in Burlington, where our streets and traffic flow are not designed to accommodate such high residential density. I have driven Thomas Alton Blvd. almost daily for three years and have already experienced the rapid build-up in traffic. My young grandchildren live on Thomas Alton Blvd., and I am concerned for their safety as more and more vehicles race past. A development of two 19 storey residential towers will have a significant negative impact on an already strained infrastructure of residential streets.

As I'm sure you know, the schools that serve the families of Alton Village cannot accommodate the influx of the additional residents of the proposed towers. I suspect that means busing our kids past existing schools to schools outside of Alton Village. That's wrong on many levels. It works against the best interest of our children, and of our families.

Economic development is critical to all of us who are grateful to call Burlington 'home'. However, this ill-conceived proposal serves only the financial interests of the landowner and tower developer. The new residents of these towers would be better served if the towers were located in an alternative area of our city that can accommodate their needs better than Alton Village can. The existing residents of Alton Village would be better served if the land were turned into much-needed green space and a park.

Perhaps a solution that would satisfy all would be to construct two buildings of 9 rather than 19 storeys each, with access onto Palladium as well as Thomas Alton Blvd. That is in keeping more with downtown Burlington with its limited high rise towers.
