Thank you for your inquiry, we hear your concerns regarding the impact of adding a sidewalk. As we understand, staff have evaluated the roads in the Strathcona Gardens area and the findings of the sidewalk warrant demonstrated a significant need. Updated Strathcona Rehabilitation - Applevalley Lane Feedback

Hello Bob and Team

I am a homeowner and live at

Per the website, I am providing feedback on

the proposal by today, Feb 15th.

I have concerns / comments as follows with respect to Applevalley Lane. The form does not allow for this feedback to be written on the form. I am sending by email as offered.

Option 4 - no sidewalk

I am concerned that the form as designed seems to direct that there is not an option to have no sidewalk (unmerited) on Applevalley but to have a sidewalk on Strathcona (merited). Please clarify.

Narrowing of the road

I live directly on one of the two elbows on Applevalley that is much wider than that straight section of road. As I understand from the overview, the road will be narrowed to 9m wide - what is the plan for the elbows - I expect you will say they will remain at the current curb placement due to the storm drain placements. Please confirm.

Snow removal

We have significant concern on the North Side of Applevalley (The side you have recommended for the sidewalk) due to the 'double plowing' that occurs in winter. The South side gets one scrape to the curb, the north wide (the trucks drive west from Strathcona to Walkers require two ploughing runs in the elbows to clear the snow to the curb and this results in SIGNIFICANT SNOW piles - those piles would then be placed on the sidewalk and would need to be cleared by the city sidewalk plow.

Liability and Risk

As I understand the city bylaws, the city is responsible for the removal of all snow on sidewalks. The non-standard placement of sidewalks directly at the curb (not allowing for a small patch of grass between sidewalk and curb) means that snow will be more directly piled on the sidewalks. As a homeowner, I will not accept the legal liability for clearing snow from a sidewalk that is non-standard (no grass) and I want the City to acknowledge its responsibility with respect to clearing the snow from the Applevalley asphalt onto the sidewalk and subsequently the city's responsibility for clearing the sidewalk.

Traffic Volume Assumptions on Applevalley are NOT accurate

I have extensive experience as a telematics company in doing traffic studies for traffic volume - our company is doing this now in New York City.

While I appreciate that the calculations for yes/no sidewalk are simple:

1) pedestrian traffic at peak in the AM, peak in the PM

Agreed the AM peak is about 5 pedestrians, the 25 PM peak has not been my experience along the segment on Applevalley from Elmhurst Crescent to Strathcona - I cannot comment on the pedestrian volume at PM peak from Elmhurst to Walkers Line (which is short segment). **Both factors** are <u>under</u> the threshold for single sidewalk.

2) number of homes

The number of homes at 32 homes exceeds the 30 home number for a sidewalk however it is worth noting that many lots are corner lots and recessed lots at the other elbow on Applevalley so this is **not** a **sufficient factor to motivate the sidewalk**.

3) Average Annual Daily Traffic -

The "measured traffic volume" of 400 average daily vehicles is *outrageously inaccurate or misleading*. There are perhaps 200 cars average that pass by each of the two segments of Applevalley (segment 1 is Applevale Court to Strathcona, segment 2 is Applevale Court to Walkers Line) - **it is misleading to say 400 cars pass through Applevalley** Lane which is the implication of the summary study. Each segment **may have 200** vehicles as homeowners from the midpoint on Applevalley and Applevale Court may choose to go to Walkers or Strathcona. There is no through traffic from Walkers to Strathcona. I would like to review the 'measured traffic volume study' with our experts. In front of our home, we see an average of 12 cars per hour - **no more than 200 a day**.

There is no volume vehicle traffic, pedestrian volume or home lots justification for any sidewalk on Applevalley Lane. This is not to say that Strathcona - a Walker's Line bypass road that connects Lakeshore to New Street should not have a sidewalk as well - There is significant traffic on Strathcona, speed concerns on Strathcona (a speed bump was installed).

The way the feedback form is created it seems that the No Sidewalk option is No Sidewalk for all - this is a bad assumption - where clearly on the actual observable numbers - Applevalley does NOT require a sidewalk but Strathcona DOES require a sidewalk for pedestrian safety reasons.

Placement North or South

How did the team come to the decision to go north side vs south side? South side has less snow plow build up, less land elevation and tree obstacles?

Alternative

In the spirit of being proactive - I understand the importance of pedestrian safety and I do not believe the expense is justified on Applevalley. If the City would like a compromise to the expense of a concrete sidewalk on Applevalley Lane if, despite the facts that a sidewalk is not justified on Applevalley Lane, I would suggest that painted bike/pedestrian lanes clearly marked on the asphalt surface of Applevalley Lane will accomplish the safety interests of the very few pedestrians (5 at peak AM).

Please respond with the city's position with respect to the homeowner's responsibility (liability) to
clear the sidewalks you propose. If homeowners are taking on more risk by having sidewalks in from

I apologize for the lateness of this e-mail on the above noted subject; to which my preference is OPTION #4 (i.e. no sidewalks) but I was trying to organize my thoughts. The following are some of the reasons why I came to this decision.

The addition of sidewalks will detract from the character of the Strathcona Garden area, which is one reason my new neighbour at chose to buy in this area.

The +/- \$700k that has been set aside for sidewalks in this project could easily be deleted as line item without impacting the rest of the project and could be used to reduce the 2019 projected tax increase for the Capital and Operating Budgets. No sidewalks means no need to clear them of snow; particularly since Lorraine Crescent is one of the last streets to be plowed, and there is no point cleaning a curb side sidewalk before the road is done. The sidewalk clearing would be an ongoing cost that would add to the operating budget.

It was stated that the construction of the sidewalks would require the removal of some 30 trees and likely cause undue stress on many others. I believe that the removal of even one tree is too many given the current tree reduction in Burlington due to the Ash Borer issue and the rampant removal of private trees to satisfy current unchecked housing rebuilds and renovations.

Personally I wouldn't use the sidewalks when I walk my dog at night because it is more likely to put me in harm's way with coyotes which often use the shadows of properties to sneak up on the unsuspecting – being out in the middle of the street gives you some protection.

The catwalk seems to be the focal point of the pedestrian activity and I find two 2 hour sample sizes on one day to be a rather insignificant sample size. I suspect that trying to restrict parking on Lorraine in the vicinity of the catwalk is not likely to be very successful. I think the better bet would be to correct the source of the issue which is vehicle traffic trying to make a left onto New Street without the benefit of traffic lights. The easiest solution may be to reverse the traffic flow around the church so you have two lanes of exiting traffic with lights.

I recently became aware of plans to install sidewalks on both sides of Lorraine Crescent in 2019. The issue that apparently is being addressed is the irresponsible behaviour of parents dropping off their children on the street to take them through the walkway in the morning and afternoon to St. Raphael's Catholic School.

Ripping up the residents driveways, landscaping and large old trees to install unnecessary sidewalks on Lorraine Crescent is not an acceptable or effective answer to the behaviour of a few parents. St. Raphael's school has a systemized drop off program with adult supervision. If these parents simply entered the parking lot from New Street, as the majority of them do, all the children would be delivered safely to school.

If a parent would like to walk their child directly to the play ground, there is the plaza parking lot across from the school (across New Street) with crossing guard and traffic lights. This is a far safer solution.

The solution that would end the unsafe practice would be to install **No stopping/parking signs from 8:00-9:00 am and 3:00-4:00 pm Monday-Friday**.

- This would allow:
 - o residents to maintain their current driveways and properties, many of which have invested significant funds in landscaping over the past few years.
 - o parents to conform to the drop off procedures already established at the school

- o prevent children from running from the end of the walkway across St. Raphael's parking lot
- o prevent children from running out the end of the walkway onto Lorraine Cr.
- maintain the integrity of driveway parking for multiple vehicles for residents, many with single lane driveways. Currently residents are able to park multiple cars in their driveways since there are no sidewalks eliminating the need for on street parking.
- o significant cost saving for the city with this project.

My husband and I have owned a home on for nearly 20 years. It is a safe and quiet street that we have raised three children on. Most of the residents on our crescent are long time residents – some of which have grown up on the street.

There has never been a need for sidewalks on Lorraine Crescent. We do not have a lot of foot traffic aside from local residents and we are all very conscious and courteous of one another.

We do have an issue with parents of St Raphael's school who drive up the street and then abandon their cars all over at the corner of Lorraine/McIntosh. There are barely any people that walk our street to the school or church. Only some cars that drive up the New St side of Lorraine and then they ditch their cars along the area of the catwalk. We would love the city to address this issue and perhaps ticket the cars that are left unattended in the intersection — especially during the winter when we have snowbanks. I have had to maneuver my vehicle through multiple cars and that is an annoyance. This occurs around 8:30 am and 3:00 pm. If the city sent a parking officer out this could be resolved quickly — and add no parking. The school provides plenty of parking and they ask parents to park across New St in the parking lot for the plaza. Some enforcement of this would be fantastic!

Otherwise – this is an amazing street! I walked my kids to Tuck without sidewalks for 8 years. They then walked to Nelson. Residents are very aware of anyone on the street and it is a wide road with plenty of room. I am a dog walker as well. Some of our neighbors have gorgeous gardens and I would hate to see them spoiled for no reason.

Lorraine Crescent has almost zero traffic beyond residents. If you come during the nicer months you will find road hockey games and kids biking up and down the street. It is a very safe street. As stated above – the only issues we have is with the parents of St Raphael's leaving their cars all over the street, This should be a no parking area at the intersection. The city would save a ton of money simply by putting up no parking signs – rather than sidewalks.

I am writing in reference to the City of Burlington installing sidewalks on Lorraine Crescent in Burlington (Capital Projects RD-R1548 Lorraine Cres. Sidewalk Study). As a resident who lives on a regular basis the low amount of pedestrians whom use our street. As our street is not a main artery, it is not warranted to add sidewalks to this street as there is little car and pedestrian traffic. Also the cost of adding sidewalks to a street with little traffic should be removed from the budget as it is a waste of tax payers money which could be better utilized in other government business.

The City of Burlington undertook a study to look at traffic flow on our street. It is my understanding that this study was completed over one day and did not take into account the amount of traffic that occurs over a week or month. Surely, the recommendation made to add costly sidewalks was not done with a one day observation of activity? More thorough investigation should be done before a costly recommendation is provided. And when completing a study, why were residents' input not gained during this study? We are the people whom live here daily and can provide valuable information and provide more cost-effective recommendations.

It was noted that in this study, a "near-miss" occurred with a cyclist on the catwalk from St. Raphael's school to Lorraine Cres. was observed. This near-miss could be better dealt with other strategies rather than the installation of sidewalks; i.e. gates on either end of the catwalk that would prevent bikers from riding straight down the catwalk without slowing down, 30 km/hr signage, no parking/stopping signs at the end of the catwalk and/or the addition of a speed bump midway along Lorraine Cres (both N/S bound and E/W bound). These strategies would be a lot more cost-effective to taxpayers that installing sidewalks.

In an effort for the City to remain transparent and accountable to the community that you serve, I would appreciate a chance to review this study in its entirety to understand the concerns that the City has and why sidewalks would be recommended on a low traffic street. Please forward me a copy of this e-mail address so the residents of Lorraine Cres. can review it.

Of greater concern is the effect of installing sidewalks to the many trees, shrubs and gardens that the residents of Lorraine Crescent have installed and lovely maintained over the years to beautiful our community. Installation of sidewalks on the east side of Lorraine Cres. (house numbers 4121-4139) would require the removal of 5 mature trees (two 100+ years old), 3 shrubs and 5 gardens (one of these gardens at 4131 is an absolute show-stopper which has taken years and enormous cost to prefect). Installation of sidewalks on the west side of Lorraine Cres. (house numbers 4122-4140) would require the removal of 3 mature trees, 1 shrub and 2 gardens (again one of these gardens is spectacular). While it may not seem that important to preserve trees and plants, once removed there is an impact to our community and to the environment. The preservation of mature trees should be of high priority as they are often sacrificed due to human involvement (especially since the need for sidewalks is not warranted on this low-activity street).

I have been told that an information session is scheduled in the near future regarding this issue. It would be appreciated that the study is first circulated to the residents so that we can review it prior to this meeting.

Subject: Sidewalks in Stratcona Neighbourhood

Hi Shawna

Congratulations on your new appointment on council. I understand that in the spring there is a plan to put in sidewalks on Lorraine Cres. I live on Lorraine Cres and wanted to let you know I disagree with this initiative.

1. Need:

- Why is this initiative being considered now, Lorraine is not a major street it is residential tertiary street?
- How many trees, shrubs, and other plants will be cut down as a result of sidewalks being installed?
- What is the square footage of greenspace that will not be converted to concrete?

As you know the Strathcona Gardens neighbourhood was developed almost 60 years ago. A number of homes have planted trees that now provide a canopy over the street scape (Strathcona Dr.). As well, these trees provide number of environmental benefits including oxygen, home for wild life and aesthetics. An interesting fact is two mature trees provide enough oxygen for a family of four.

As you know trees and grass also absorb rainwater. With climate change and evidence of more storms I am concerned about water run off and basement flooding from sidewalks and fewer trees. Is this a concern of yours?

2. Cost:

The cost to build and maintain sidewalks is another factor. One reason why both you and the mayor and others were elected in October was to keep growth at a moderate level and provide a forum for better participation by residents. I suggest that the way this initiative has been communicated to residence has been quite poor. Some residents were informed by the town arborist who was reluctant to disclose why he was measuring the width of trees in neighbour's front yards.

Moderate levels of growth will mean less in property tax revenues in the mid to long term. Therefore, fiscal prudence today is necessary to sustain our future. The cost of planning, design, installation and often forgotten ongoing maintenance costs - repair, cleaning, snow removal, sanding, signage, additional street lights, crosswalks are all factors. Can you please provide the costs of the above and consider the cost in the decision making?

3. Aesthetic and historical considerations:

Burlington is often cited as one of the best places to live in Canada. Some of the criteria for this selection is the aesthetic nature of our neighbourhoods. Sidewalks will change the residential character of the community – There is an existing historical character of the streets and neighbourhood. The width of Lorraine is much wider than most tertiary roads this was a design feature at the time. As sidelines as a driver are very good and provide enough room for pedestrians, bikes and cars.

As well street parking is currently almost unheard of as there is enough room in driveways for cars. Driveway parking will be reduced with sidewalks. I often time visit relatives in Headon Forest and the number of cars on the streets creates a safety issues for drivers as their site lines are compromised with the number of vehicles on the streets. I imagine that other services such as garbage collection and snow plows are more efficient in the Strathcona neighbourhood as opposed to Headon Forest due to fewer cars parked on the road.

4. City planning

Finally, there have been quite a few examples of poorly planned and executed infrastructure projects in the city. The cost to construct New Street initially with a bike lane then reconstruct the street with no bike lane was high. As well I am not sure that city staff took into account the opportunity cost and environmental impact of slower traffic on residents during both construction phases. The cost to construct the Burlington pier is another example of poor fiscal and planning choices. The pier is beautiful, yet construction was poorly managed regardless of the reasons/excuses why city staff or the former mayor may have provided. My overall suggestion to you as city counsellor is to hold the bureaucracy to account and establish strategic direction for the vision of our city, the way citizens should be engaged and costs.

In closing I would like to know your position on the sidewalks and what you can do to get this decision stopped. A couple suggestions I have is to survey the neighbourhood and see what the residents want. Review the cost and environmental considerations. And question city staff and hold them to account.

We need to sustain our city and not have staff frankly look for make work projects in order to spend operating budgets. If the only capital projects now needed in the city is to build sidewalks in established areas then maybe it's time to reduce the size of the planning and building department.

Thank you for taking time to read and respond to my email. I would be very happy to discuss this initiative with you.

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

I have been living on Strathcona Drive for 32 years, we moved here when the kids were 2 and 4 years of age and they both attended St. Raphael and Assumption High School. In those 32 years I have NEVER once thought that we should have sidewalks on our street.

I agree that the curb on both side of the street need re-building and the sewers and water mains on the west side of Strathcona have been problematic and need to be addressed but I have issues and concerns over building new sidewalks on one or both sides of the street.

These are my concerns:

Elderly residents, including myself at age 58 (I had a ski accident which resulted in a back injury) don't want the additional work of shovelling the sidewalks.

Cutting down trees changing gardens some with massive rocks in our neighbourhood would change the look and feel of our environment that we love so dearly.

My driveway is asphalt with interlocking stones which would need to be re-designed.

Since cars can't park across a sidewalk, putting in sidewalks would reduce the amount of parking space on a driveway, a particular problem as we have 3 hour parking rules in Burlington

Having sidewalks on just one side will force more people to cross the street, and the more you do that, the greater the chances of a collision.

Strathcona is not a busy street only the local resident drive on this road from New Street to Lakeshore Road, there is no room for condo's or apartments that would warrant having to accommodate an influx of residents, there's not much traffic, the kids play on the street and I have never felt that to be an issue, The speed bumps have been effective and are doing their jobs, I don't think sidewalks would add any benefits for the residents.

I am on a fix income and cannot afford my taxes to go up or any charges to me as a result of the upgrades proposed. I DO NOT WANT to consider a move from the area as I LOVE my neighbourhood.

Thx for all the detailed info. and opportunity for feedback. We really like option 3.

Traffic and pedestrian flow definitely calls for a safer method for walking -- kids to and from school, dog walkers, moms with strollers, etc.

Forward looking idea as area is turning over -- probably reticence among some original owners who are empty-nesters (...many still on Strathcona; one with a petition for owners to sign) and simply use their car, have adult kids, etc. They probably feel like sidewalks encroach on "their" property.

BUT as the city survey indicates, there are many pedestrians and with road construction it's a great opportunity to improve the street (more walkable), increase property value and make walking safer. This is especially true with parked cars on the street wherein walkers have to walk around them and into two way traffic. I do hope the priority of safety becomes the city's main priority in this decision, especially when their own surveys indicate the streets in question warrant a sidewalk. We really don't see a practical negative to adding sidewalks, save the loss of a few trees or shrubs.

Perhaps option 3 is a bit of a compromise for those who are stuck on keeping the status quo -- 1 sidewalk, as opposed to two. And based on survey results, it would seem like 1 sidewalk would suffice.

Hello Shawna,

Congratulations on your election to city council. I trust that the next four years will be rewarding and productive.

In December I became aware of the city's proposal to install sidewalks on Strathcona Drive and Lorraine Crescent.

This was from a neighbour who was circulating a petition against such installation. Prior to this all that was known was that roadway re-paving would be completed in 2019 (and in my opinion at least 5 years overdue).

I did receive a notice in the mailbox from the city dated August 21, 2018 - Strathcona Drive Area Minor Reconstruction (see attached).

But it was only to inform me of the impending presence of survey crews as a first step in making improvements to the roadway and curbs.

There is no mention at all of sidewalks or street lights.

I was curious when I saw the crews doing what seemed to be excessive survey work for just minor reconstruction of asphalt and sidewalks.

Perhaps they already knew they were going to install sidewalks. Otherwise, why do extensive survey work?

The next indication of this proposal was via email in your newsletter on Jan 11, 2019. This thankfully informed me about the new proposed extensive work on the area streets and the upcoming public open house on Jan 30, 2019.

But what about the residents who don't subscribe to your newsletter or even know about it.

How does the city disseminate information to the residents directly affected? I have not seen any communication from the city regarding either the proposal for sidewalks or the open house meeting.

I would think that a letter in the mailbox would be a minimum - just like the one warning me about the rather benign survey crews in the area.

So, how did sidewalks and street lights creep into this project? When did it creep in? Your newsletter states that "In addition to this work, sidewalks are also warranted on Strathcona Drive, Lorraine Crescent and Apple Valley Lane."

Warranted? How? By whom?

Is there a groundswell of demand for sidewalks from residents?

Is there some research study that has determined that these sidewalks are warranted and not on streets such as Grapehill, Fairlawn, Camelot and Elmhurst. What's the difference?

These are the issues that I see:

Sidewalk installation will necessitate the removal of trees, albeit this is mitigated with curb-faced sidewalks. However, a significant number of trees will sustain severe root damage and likely will kill off these trees quickly.

Sidewalk installation will necessitate damaging the lower part of the driveway and will have to be patched leaving an unsightly driveway prone to cracking and winter freezing upheaval and will require replacement sooner than anticipated at significant expense.

Sidewalk installation will remove 4-5 feet of usable driveway space. A visitor to my home would be required to park on the street rather than in the driveway due to the new space limitation. Perhaps I might even be forced to install a double wide driveway. This then promotes more water runoff into the sewer system rather than absorbed into the ground.

Who would be responsible to clear the snow from the sidewalk? Especially the windrow dumped by the plows on a curb facing sidewalk.

If the city is going to take ownership/responsibility of clearing the sidewalk does homeowner insurance recognize this or will homeowners still be at risk for liability and therefore still be forced to clear it of the snow.

City owned sidewalk plows and salters destroys adjacent grass and the environment. Who is going to be responsible for the repair and maintenance of the grass? What about the salt seeping into the environment and the carbon emissions from the plows?

Sidewalks are expensive to install and maintain. This money is better spent on some other useful project, or saving the money and reducing the inevitable property tax increase that now seems to be both automatic and excessive.

There is no option for no sidewalks on one street but sidewalks on another. It's a package deal. All or nothing. That is, either Strathcona, Lorraine and Apple Valley all get sidewalks or none of them get sidewalks. There is no delete option for Lorraine. I can't even imagine that Lorraine requires sidewalks whereas Grapehill, Fairlawn, Camelot and Elmhurst don't.

I look forward to attending the open house meeting on January 30 to meet with you and city staff to learn more about this proposal and the process in which we got to this point.

I have read the budgeted project costs as updated on the web page.

As I read it the total cost to install sidewalks on one side of Apple Valley, both sides of Strathcona and both sides of Lorraine is \$681,000 calculated as:

Option one - all sidewalks = \$3,164,000. Option four - no sidewalks = \$2,783,000 Difference equates as the total cost of all sidewalks = \$681,000

The approximate distance this covers is 3,250 metres calculated as: Apple Valley = 450 metres Strathcona = 1,000 metres $x^2 = 2,000$ metres Lorraine = 400 metres $x^2 = 800$ metres Total = 3,250 metres

Therefore the total cost of sidewalks per metre is \$681,000/3,250 metres = approx. \$210 per metre.

The estimated average lot size is 60 feet wide = approx. 18 metres.

Therefore the average cost per lot is 18 metres \times \$210 per metre = \$3,780 per lot.

Given the above:

- 1. Are my calculations correct? Please correct me if I have erred.
- 2. Is it the intention to recommend having the individual homeowners foot the bill for this under the guise of a local improvement?
- 3. If so, how much will each homeowner be required to pay? What is the calculation for local improvements (sidewalks).

The above is paramount to know before the January 30 PIC so that the residents can be fully aware of what is taking place and they may ask pertinent questions at the meeting.

As you can see by the subject, I am corresponding with you in regards to the proposed sidewalks on Strathcona Drive, Lorraine Crescent and Apple Valley Lane.

I, like the majority of the neighbourhood, am opposed to sidewalks in our area.

I have lived here 32 years. I raised my family here. My grandchildren visit here now as well. All these years both my children and their children have used their scooters and bikes with no safety issues. As well I was employed by St Raphael's school for 12 years. During those years it was a daily exercise to walk a fairly large group of special needs children through our neighbourhood. Once again, we never feared for their safety. If anything, no sidewalks was a marvellous learning tool for our kids.

I also have been the owner of numerous dogs that I have walked around the neighbourhood over the years with no fear of safety

Our streets in this area do not need sidewalks.

Sidewalks will pose many more problems than eliminating problems.

There will be many trees affected.

Option 1 -26

Option 2-20

Option 3-7

Option 4-1.

There also would be 2 large bushes on Lorraine's inner circle affected.

Based on the recommended option by the city ,we would lose the benefit of 1300 lbs of carbon dioxide being absorbed and nearly 7000 lbs of oxygen produced. This translates to 65 cars CO2 emissions being absorbed and a loss of oxygen produced for over 50 people in a year.

Based on the recommended option again, the green space loss(grass) translates to 3600 sq meters of sidewalk, about half a football field of green space lost. That amount of grass releases enough oxygen for 60 families of 4 while absorbing carbon dioxide and more.

Climate change is also creating more severe storms and rains. Remember the 2014 flood? As far as I know concrete does not absorb rain but GRASS does.

I agree that we need new street lights as well as new curbs. This would certainly enhance our area.

As far as the cost of sidewalks the money would be far better spent in an effort for traffic calming. A successful example of that would be Merton Avenue in Toronto.

All we ever asked for was a speed reduction on our street. The city did put new speed limit signs up and traffic calming signs up, thank you for that. The speed bump that was erected is totally dysfunctional. We had suggested alternatives to that, better suited for our street before it was installed. Unfortunately it fell on deaf ears.

I strongly urge you to reconsider your plan of action. It would be a far greater benefit to our neighbourhood as well as our wonderful city.

I know we have a new mayor, as well as a new council representatives. We were some of the people that voted for a change.

I, along with fellow neighbours hope this doesn't fall on deaf ears.



Dear City of Burlington Councillors

I am a resident in Ward 4. Shawna Stolte is our Councillor. There is a proposal that will come forward to council regarding installing sidewalks in the neighbourhood. Councillor Stolte and the Mayor both attended a PIC regarding this issue and I believe both appreciated the number of interested residents and overwhelming majority who disagreed with this initiative.

Shawna suggested that the residents contact you individually regarding this issue. I am hopeful she will be talking to you about this issue. In the meantime, I thought I would send you some information regarding the environmental degradation, costs and overall impact of sidewalks in the Strathcona Gardens neighbourhood.

I am curious to learn how you plan to vote at council regarding the sidewalks in the Strathcona Neighbourhood. I would be happy as I am sure others in the neighbourhood would be to discuss any questions you may have regarding this issue as I am convinced this proposal that is not good value for taxpayer dollar.

Here are some thoughts that may help you appreciate the negative impacts of sidewalks in the neighbourhood. City staff are recommending "Option 1" which is sidewalks on both sides of the street.

How many trees, shrubs, and other plants will be cut down as a result of sidewalks being installed?

Per the options presented in the Project Update.

١	Option 1 - 26	Option 2 – 20	Option 3 – 7	Option 4 - 1
-	Option 1 20	T Option 2 20	Option 5 /	Option + 1

This includes 2 Ash trees which require removal unrelated to construction. And there are 5 trees which may be saved, subject to root location and construction impact. There is also 2 large bushes on Lorraine's inner circle which will be impacted if a sidewalk is installed per Option 1, 2 or 3.

Facts about trees: A single mature tree can absorb carbon dioxide at a rate of 48 lbs/year and release 260 lbs/year oxygen back into the atmosphere. Based on the above under the recommended option 1 the neighbourhood will lose the benefit of $^{\sim}1,300$ lbs of carbon dioxide being absorbed and nearly 7000 lbs of oxygen produced. This translates to an average of 65 cars CO_2 emissions being absorbed and the loss of oxygen produced to service over 50 people in a year. Unfortunately an official last night suggested that other trees could be planted to replace those cut down. The problem with that solution is the time for trees to mature is quite long and the environment will be negatively impacted with these trees being cut down.

Environmental impact of sidewalks: 3600 sqm of sidewalk is about half a football field in green space that will be lost. 3600 sqm of grass releases enough oxygen for 60 families of four, while absorbing carbon dioxide, hydrogen fluoride and perosyacetyle nitrate. Climate change is also creating more 100 year storms (remember summer of 2014 flood). Grass absorbs rain sidewalks create more runoff and increases the potential of flooding.

Based on the above under the recommended option the neighbourhood will lose the benefit of enough oxygen for an additional 60 families of four.

The cost to build the sidewalk is estimated at a minimum of ~\$700,000. This excludes the cost to maintain a sidewalk. A city representative mentioned at the PIC that the city would be clearing the sidewalks of snow. I understand that the budget shortfall is somewhere in the range of \$1.5M and that the tree planting program is currently unfunded. The \$700,000 could be used to fund those shortfalls. Also as a comparator below are the increased to various local boards proposed in Burlington's 2019 budget is about \$317K. Therefore, the

cost savings of not building sidewalks could be used to pay for these expenses. I was concerned by an official who repeatedly stated that there would be "no cost to residence to build the sidewalks." This is incorrect. Any expenditures that the city makes is accrued through either the tax base or user fees. So it is misrepresenting the facts at best and a falsehood at worst to suggest to citizens otherwise.

Dear Bob.

Thank you for allowing the community to provide input on the decision whether to add sidewalks to the Strathcona Drive area street rehabilitation. Having lived in and around the Strathcona area for about 58 years I will go on record as choosing <u>OPTION 4 NO Sidewalks</u>. There are numerous reasons for this position.

- 1) This is a waste of tax payer dollars. The amount of foot traffic on the proposed street is minimal at best. I drive, walk and bike in the area and the amount of traffic to contend with is minimal at best. While the bulk of the foot traffic goes to JT Tuck and Nelson High school, the preferred paths are along Spruce or Belvenia (which both have sidewalks). Strathcona is NOT a preferred route to travel for kids in the area.
- 2) The Halton Catholic School board has discussed the elimination of St. Raphael's school. A future decision to close the school will either result in bus traffic to a new Catholic school or more kids heading to JT Tuck. Again, sidewalks not required.
- There has been NO intensification in this area since the mid-1960s. So for over 50 years there have not been any issues with increased traffic. People who use these streets in question are residents of the area. Why the need to add sidewalks as things have been good for the past 50 years and likely will be fine for the next 100 years?
- 4) Any recent issue(s) of traffic increases came as a result of city council's "stupid" decision to narrow New Street from Walkers Line to Rossmore Blvd. This decision created a bottle neck that forced drivers down to Spruce and Lakeshore or up to Rexway Dr. Now that "common sense" has returned and New Street is back to four lanes, traffic into the sub-division has returned to a "sleepy normal".
- 5) There are areas in Burlington that do not have sidewalks... never did and never will. A good portion of Bird land does not have sidewalks. Portions of Mountianside do not have sidewalks. Selected sections of the east end do not have sidewalks. Certain areas in the city core (south of Central high school do not have sidewalks). I had a property on Oakland's Park and there were no sidewalks... nor would the residents allow it. Our community has no sidewalks and the bulk of the community in this established area prefers it that way.

- 6) We chose to move back into this "established" area for the atmosphere and the look of the properties. I don't want the sidewalks to detract from the look I moved back here for.
- 7) Adding sidewalks is only going to create more problems anyway. With the recent snow storms I have taken the initiative to snow blow parts of the sidewalks on Spruce (which do not get shovelled due either aging population or renters not looking after the rental property). Adding more sidewalks increases the chance for a pedestrian to fall and the liability the city may face (especially when the home owners do not want the sidewalks, won't look after them) ...and are NOT a necessity.
- 8) The needless environmental impact involved in the removal of trees, plants and vegetation to place concrete makes zero sense. It flies in the face of having more "green" space.
- 9) I have recently driven throughout neighbourhoods with the proposed style of sidewalks and have observed the snow situation. While the home owner may have shovelled, the plow has placed the snow from the street right back onto the sidewalk. Given the density of the snow from the road, the average citizen will not be able to shovel off the sidewalk. The sidewalks observed had been cleaned by a city sidewalk plows. Strathcona and surrounding streets are not a high priority streets thus it may take days to the sidewalks to be cleared by the city. The city will incur additional ongoing costs for snow removal and this is again a waste of tax payer money.

Bob as a final thought, This past fall we saw a change in government here in the city. Residents voted to stop the wasted spending and the non-common sense decision making as it pertained to our city. The mayor was elected on her common sense approach in dealing with the city. A simple decision like this (to add sidewalks where they are not wanted/ needed) could be a deciding factor as to whether the council gets a second term.

As stated earlier, I vote No to Sidewalks as you complete the Strathcona Rehabilitation.

In his email to you dated 2019-02-14, brought to your attention the fact that the vehicle count on Apple Valley Lane is completely erroneous. He makes this point:

• The recorded value was just under 400 trips per day on Apple Valley Lane - that is an ABSURD number (waaayy too high). That piece of information should not be added to the public record because it is false.

Disturbed by this comment about one of your "facts", I had a second look at a <u>Sidewalk Warrant Review Sheet</u> for Lorraine Crescent from your City files [attached]. And found the value of "370 - Modelled" in the <u>Measured Traffic Volume column</u>. I have two points of concern:

- 1. The item indicates Modelled, not Measured. Which raises the question: what algorithm was used here? Is it any more accurate than the 400 vehicles per day in your Apple Valley Lane study?
- 2. As you know, Lorraine is a Crescent; it does not go anywhere. Which means there is Zero through traffic; all those "370" vehicles are local traffic. i.e. folk going to and from homes on the crescent. **Does local traffic warrant sidewalks?**

Just in case you missed it, the locals are up in arms in opposition to the installation of sidewalks in the Strathcona Drive area.

Re: Strathcona Drive - Street Rehabilitation

I want to start by saying that I am appreciative of the upcoming resurfacing of my street Strathcona Drive. I attended the Information Meeting on January 30th and I am familiar with the four construction options. The comments below pertain solely to <u>Strathcona Drive</u>.

My preference for the Rehabilitation is **Option #4 – no sidewalks**.

I walk along Strathcona Drive with my dog every day at 8:30, 10:00 a.m. and then again around 5 p.m. In my experience there is very minimal traffic at these times between Lakeshore and Spruce Ave. There is considerable cross traffic at Spruce Ave heading towards Walkers' Line. Less of the traffic at Spruce also heads towards New Street. I have read the City Sidewalk Installation Policy. I understand that on Strathcona the count recorded was 828 vehicles per day and that the count was taken near the corner of Strathcona and Spruce Ave. I wonder if the count included the cross traffic on Spruce as in my experience there is very little traffic on Strathcona Drive even in the peak hours. Spruce Ave is on a main school route and the amount of vehicle/pedestrian traffic is considerably higher than on Strathcona. Including the cross traffic at Spruce would have significantly increased the vehicles /pedestrians count on Strathcona and may have given an inflated representation of the through traffic on Strathcona.

This winter I have been observing traffic patterns on streets like Belvenia that have sidewalks. With the amount of ice and snow we have had, the sidewalks have been treacherous. Most often pedestrians choose to walk on the road to avoid the icy conditions of the sidewalk. This leads to increased risk for pedestrians. Sidewalks are not always a guarantee of safety. A better option is to leave the less traveled roads wide so that pedestrians can choose a safe path when they are walking.

The majority of residents on Strathcona Drive do not want sidewalks. The residents live in this community for its established park like environment. We have modest homes, with large lots surrounded by mature trees. We value our proximity to the lake, enjoy our open space and do not want to lose our green lawns to concrete sidewalks and narrow streets.

Again, my preference is for Option #4. However, if we are doomed to the sidewalks on Strathcona Drive, I would like to suggest <u>another option</u>. The snow clearing patterns and my experience of walking and driving our street has made me aware of the difference of traffic patterns above and below Spruce Ave. There is more traffic both car and pedestrian from Spruce to New St. than from Lakeshore to Spruce. I would like to suggest sidewalks on one side from Spruce to New St. and no sidewalks from Lakeshore to Spruce as another option.

Thank you for reading my letter. I trust you will consider the information in your decision making.
