
Regional Official Plan Review

Overview


- There is a legislative requirement for the Region to update the ROP to conform with recently updated Provincial Plans and Provincial Policy Statement.
- Regional Official Plan Review (ROPR) is also an opportunity to examine the evolving trends in the Region
- Current ROPR is a scoped exercise that addresses specific strategic issues.
- Other inputs into the ROPR process include:
 - · Review of local municipal official plans; and
 - Minutes of Settlement for OMB/LPAT cases.

ROPR and Local Municipal Context

- ROPR determines how and where Local Municipalities grow based on:
 - Local identification of areas appropriate for growth (e.g. MTSAs)
 - Efficient and cost-effective infrastructure
 - Complete community needs
 - Protection of assets like Natural Heritage System and Prime Agricultural Areas
 - Response to Climate Change
- Local OPs must conform to Halton OP within one year.





Growth Plan Requirements Regional Urban Structure


- Integrated planning to accommodate population and employment forecasts in Provincial Growth Plan

- Assess need and location for settlement boundary expansion


- Policy context and requirements of Growth Plan (2019)


Local Municipal Role Regional Urban Structure

 - Implement the Regional Official Plan Amendment into Local Official Plans

Strategic Growth Areas

Urban Growth Centres (UGCs)

 City has requested the Region through the MCR, to adjust the boundary of the Downtown Burlington UGC to generally align with the lands in proximity to the Burlington GO Station

Major Transit Station Areas

- All GO Station MTSAs should be Protected MTSAs under the Growth Plan
- No concerns with the Region's proposal to remove the Downtown Burlington MTSA/Mobility Hub from the ROP as permitted by the Province
- No concerns with Burlington GO and Appleby GO MTSA proposed boundaries
- Aldershot GO MTSA proposed boundary is consistent with Region's delineation methodology following NHS boundary

Corridors and other Strategic Growth Areas

- Concerns with the identified network as contained in the Defining Major Transit Requirements - focus should be placed on the local vision for corridors
- Concerns with the establishment of minimum density targets along corridors


 Encourage the Region to support the policy directions with new tools and programs to reinforce employment policies and to support employment growth within key Strategic Growth Areas

Employment Conversions


 Supportive of the identified subjects and principles set out in the employment area conversions criteria

Employment Area Additions


- Agree that not all lands that accommodate employment uses need to identified within an Employment Area
- Support the approach of working closely with the Region to refine the extent of the areas previously identified as "to be added to the Region of Halton Employment Area"




Major Transit Station Areas (MTSAs) Regional Urban Structure

Rural and Agricultural System

Phase 2 Discussion Paper

- Agricultural Systems Mapping
 - Supportive of a mutually exclusive approach that includes prime agricultural lands and key features of the Natural Heritage System
- Agriculture-related and On-Farm Diversified Uses
 - Recommend that full extent of these uses be permitted within the ROP
- Cemeteries
 - Not supportive of locating cemeteries in prime agricultural areas
- Agricultural Impact Assessment
 - Recommend re-consideration of the need for separate Regional guidelines once the draft Provincial guidelines have been finalized
- Special Needs Housing
 - Generally supportive of special needs housing outside of the urban area
