Engagement Summary

Several engagement opportunities were had with the community, neighbourhood, golfers and park users. This included an interactive virtual town hall session and a formal survey supported through the City's Get Involved Burlington platform.

The survey was only open to Burlington residents, we received 348 completed surveys, with the participants in the survey from both local Tyandaga residents (44%) to Tyandaga non-residents (56%). It was important to hear from both the golf community and the residents on the use of the land.


Of the 348 participants, 51% said yes that they would like to see some changes to Tyandaga where 30% would like to keep everything the same. The remainder of the participants where not familiar enough with the programming to provide an opinion.

Below represents a summary of what we heard.

We heard that the areas that participants valued about Tyandaga

- Access to greenspace
- Usage of the golf course and tennis courts
- Winter park activities such as tobogganing, walking and play
- A recreation space for families and neighborhood to gather and play
- Maintaining the space as Greenspace

The below chart represents the current usages of Tyandaga





Top 3 comments on changes to the golf program

- Improve golf course maintenance, cart paths, tee boxes and greens
- More opportunities for youth, including youth camps/leagues
- Improve practice facility


The below chart represents additional comments and information on the Golf program

It is also important to note, the majority of those engaged wanted to retain an 18-hole golf course, while some wanted the city to consider a permanent shift to a 9-hole golf experience. Making this change at this time would be too great of a service level change and is not recommended at this time. Any potential adjustment to a permanent 9-hole course in replacement with the existing 18-hole course could be considered annually as the market shifts and the preference of golfer's change. That said, to support more 9-hole interests and a potential future shift, the introduction of the 9-hole programs noted in the report is expected to satisfy this specific need in the short term.
