The purpose of this memo is to respond to the following staff direction received on April 7, 2022 at the Environment, Infrastructure \& Community Services Committee Meeting;

Direct the Director of Recreation, Community and Culture in consultation with Roads, Parks and Forestry to report back at Council on April 19, 2022 on increasing the size to the maximum available footprint for the leash free that could include an area for small dogs separate from big dogs at Central Park as per appendix $A$ in recreation community and culture department report RCC-04-22.

Staff have developed 2 options for council consideration. As identified in report RCC-04-22, option 1 has several benefits and challenges as noted below. The annual operating cost to maintain option 1 is $\$ 8,500$ for items such as fencing repairs, garbage removal, wood chipping, grass cutting/trimming and debris pickup. Refer to Appendix A for size and location.

Staff have prepared option 2 based on the council direction to increase the size to the maximum available footprint and include an all dog area and a separate small dog area. Option 2 will increase the pressure of the challenges identified in option 1 and present additional challenges identified below. The annual operating cost to maintain option 2 is $\$ 22,000$ for items such as fencing repairs, garbage removal, wood chipping, grass cutting/trimming, inspections, and debris pickup.
